Introduction

The Roswell Police Department provides police services to protect residents and visitors within our city. Roswell, Georgia is located 20 miles north of Atlanta. The 207-employee department serves a population of nearly 100,000 and 41.95 square miles of property. This 2022 Annual Report will explore some of Roswell Police Department's daily functions, activities and initiatives.

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From the Office of the Chief

Greetings,

2022 was a year of growth and accomplishment for the Roswell Police Department. There were many accomplishments, achievements and improvements for our department.

The Mayor and City Council adopted a "Best-in-Class Pay" plan for the Police Department. This came at a critical time. We had experienced an increase in our vacant sworn positions. After holding steady in single digit vacant positions for the past two years, we spiked up to 19 vacant sworn positions during the summer months. This increase in pay, 20% of our starting salary, attracted many well-qualified sworn personnel from surrounding police departments. We hired 36 police officers this year.

For the first time in many years, the Roswell Police Department has ZERO sworn vacant positions. This will be an ongoing priority, as we have a number of officers who are slated to retire in the upcoming months. Recruiting, hiring and retention of well-qualified employees will continue to be a high priority for our department.

Roswell residents overwhelmingly voted (73.22%) to approve a \$52 Million bond referendum to support public safety. \$23 Million will be used to create a new public safety headquarters. This facility will co-locate Police, Fire, E911 and the Emergency Operations Center into one building or campus, improving collaboration, communication and making security and infrastructure more efficient.




Linnea RivardDeputy Chief








The Office of Professional Standards (OPS) is responsible for Internal Affairs, Selection and Hiring, Accreditation, Research and Planning, and Training. The mission of this office is to ensure the integrity of the Department and its personnel through impartial investigation and developmental management.

The Roswell Police
Department has been
nationally accredited
through the Commission
on Accreditation for Law
Enforcement Agencies
(CALEA) since 1995.



The Roswell Police Department is also accredited by the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police.

The Roswell Police Department Policy and Procedures Manual specifies that all complaints and allegations of employee misconduct, received from any source, by any means, will be investigated. The Internal Affairs investigators of OPS conduct many of these investigations and keep records of the outcome.

Complaint Synopsis




There were 102 total complaints in 2022. Of those, 75 complaints were operational, which means that they did not involve misconduct by members of the Department. As a result, they do not have dispositions (a conclusion of fact).

The disposition graph depicts 55 dispositions, even though there were only 27 combined Inquiry Investigations and Formal Investigations in 2022. This result is explained by the fact that some investigations have multiple dispositions.

Training Unit



The State of Georgia requires police officers to receive at least 20 hours of training each year. The Roswell Police Department far outpaces that. In 2022, the officers of RPD completed 26,768 hours of GA POST approved training, an average of 145 hours of training per officer.



The Training Unit is dedicated to ensuring that our officers are equipped with the knowledge, training, and experience to serve the Roswell community safely and effectively.



More specifically, in 2022 our officers completed <u>607</u> hours of training focused on de-escalation, use of force and community policing.

Uniform Patrol Division


The Uniform Patrol Division (UPD) answers directly to the Deputy Chief. The UPD Commander holds the rank of Major. Roswell's UPD is divided into two daily 12-hour watches. The two watches, Day Watch and Night Watch, are each divided into two squads. Day Watch consists of A Squad and B Squad. Night Watch consists of C Squad and D Squad. Each squad is led by a Watch Commander who holds the rank of Lieutenant. There are three Sergeants that act as the line supervisors for each squad.

Each squad assigns patrol units daily to specified zones of the Department's jurisdiction to enable a rapid response for requests for police services as well as to provide optimum patrol coverage.

In 2022, UPD Officers:

- Resolved 105,319 calls for service.
- Investigated 3,652 motor vehicle accidents.
- Conducted 19,279 traffic stops.
- Issued 8,177 traffic violation citations and 8,395 warnings.
- Completed 15,022 incident reports.

Uniform Patrol Division

Traffic Enforcement Unit

The Traffic Enforcement Unit (TEU) is primarily responsible for enforcement of traffic laws that cause motor vehicle and pedestrian accidents. Their responsibilities also include hit-and-run investigations, serious injury and fatal crash investigations, traffic complaint tracking and enforcement, along with traffic enforcement across the city. TEU officers also participate in various educational programs throughout the year. TEU officers receive specialized training, allowing them to become subject matter experts in accident investigations.

In 2022, TEU Officers:

• Investigated 46 community traffic complaints for issues such as speeding, stop sign

violations, unlawful use of no-truck routes, and parking violations.

- Investigated 12 serious injury accidents,
 5 fatality accidents, and 470 hit-and-run accidents.
- Conducted 10 speed studies in various locations throughout the city to assist with analyzing possible traffic problem areas.



TEU manages numerous special events, including the Youth Day Parade, July 4th Celebration, the Memorial Day Celebration, the National Day of Prayer, National Night Out, the End of Summer Celebration, all Alive in Roswell events, numerous road races, the Day of the Dead Celebration, and Touch-a-Truck events.



In 2022, TEU continued to master the Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Platform ("UAV" or "Drone") Accident Reconstruction Program through real-life application and continued educational training.

Uniform Patrol Division

Special Operations



The Roswell Police Department, in conjunction with the City of Milton and the City of Alpharetta, maintain and staff the North Fulton SWAT team. This unit's primary objective is to address situations that require specialized tactics or equipment outside of what is typically available to uniform patrol officers. The unit also maintains trained crisis negotiators as well as tactical dispatch operators who are specifically trained to assist with the successful resolution of these incidents.

The Roswell Police Department utilizes bicycles for special details and events that call for increased mobility in confined areas. Police bicycles are also utilized to patrol the business districts, parks, residential areas, high-crime areas, and to conduct parking enforcement. They are also an aid in promoting and improving relations between the community and the Department.





In 2021, the Park Police were transferred to the Police Department from the Parks Department. Comprised of four officers and one sergeant, the Park Police maintain a safe and secure environment for residents and visitors across Roswell's more than 20 award-winning parks. Their primary duties include patrolling the parks, enforcing park rules and regulations, responding to emergencies, and providing assistance to park visitors.

Overview

The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is responsible for investigating crimes that are reported to the police, with a focus on solving complex and serious cases that require specialized skills and resources. By conducting thorough and impartial investigations, CID helps to ensure that perpetrators of crimes are held accountable for their actions and that victims receive the justice and support they deserve.

The general investigations section of CID is further divided into five subsections, each with a focus on a particular form of crime.

The <u>Persons Crimes Section</u> is responsible for investigating crimes such as murders, robberies, sex offenses, assault/battery, crimes against children, and stalking.

The <u>Property Crimes Section</u> is responsible for investigating residential and commercial burglaries, entering autos, thefts, and damage to property.

The <u>Fraud and Forgery Section</u> is responsible for investigating forgery, financial transaction card theft/fraud, identity theft, and counterfeiting.

The <u>Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Section</u> works to investigate, prosecute, and prevent internet crimes against children. Roswell's ICAC team also offers proactive education about internet safety to schools and community groups.

The <u>Crime Scene Investigations Section</u> responds to incidents where the collection of evidence requires special tools or training. A variety of traditional and modern tools are used both on the scene and in our own lab to assist detectives and prosecutors.

General Investigations

Notable Accomplishments

- Added two full-time ICAC detective positions, and awarded by the GBI as the Georgia ICAC Taskforce 2022 Affiliate of the Year.
- Partnered with the United States Secret Service on an investigation that led to the arrest of 4 men connected to a worldwide cryptocurrency scam, with losses exceeding \$100 million US dollars.
- Continued to make significant arrests in murder investigations (maintaining 100% clearance rate), other crimes against persons, and costly property crimes and fraud investigations.
- Continued to attend advanced training in homicide investigations, crimes against children, white collar crime, and other criminal offenses.



Goals for the Future:

• Establish a Special Victims Section for the investigation of violent crimes against children and vulnerable adults.

• Continue to enhance the capabilities of the CSI unit through expanded use of a forensic 3D imaging scanner.

• Establish a digital forensics lab with modern technology used to investigate internet crimes against children cases.

Cases assigned for further investigation:

- Continue to grow our information gathering/sharing initiatives to enhance the safety of our community.
- Continue to enroll our detectives in advanced, specialized training to increase employee knowledge and efficiency.

Special Investigations Section

The Special Investigations Section (SIS) of CID is an investigative support unit responsible for identifying and addressing specific crime problems and trends within the City.

During 2022, SIS took a primary role in enforcement of the new Spa

Ordinance. Over a 30-day period, 27 operations were conducted to kickstart education and enforcement of the new ordinance, with the long-term goal of combating human trafficking, prostitution, and sex & labor trafficking.

Other notable accomplishments:

- Conducted numerous follow-up investigations on citizen complaints of illegal activity, including one that led to the dismantling of a large-scale fraud scheme with over 30 victims and more than \$1 million dollars in total losses.
- Conducted focused investigative efforts on combatting street racing and reckless driving participants.
- Planned and executed numerous arrest operations on violent felons, often coordinating with outside agencies.
- Continued our partnership with the DEA Tactical Diversion Squad by maintaining one officer on their Task Force, resulting in significant weapon and drug seizures.

 Advanced the RPD Pathways program, which connects individuals and families struggling with overdose and addiction

with resources to help. As a result of their follow-up efforts, 3 individuals voluntarily entered treatment.

Goals for the Future:

 Two detectives slated to be assigned to the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) Task Force.

- Focus training and resources on modernizing narcotics investigations to keep up with new trends in trafficking.
- Expanding local partnerships for RPD Pathways program.



Investigative Analysis Unit & Canine (K9) Unit

The <u>Roswell Investigative Analysis Unit (RIAU)</u> is responsible for analyzing data to identify patterns, trends and linkages in criminal activity. This facilitates smarter directed patrols and improves overall efficiency in apprehending criminals and curbing specific problems.

Analysts provide phone analysis and other investigative support to all members of the department. They provide 24/7 support for all high-profile cases, as well as providing statistical data to members of Command Staff and others as requested.



The <u>Canine Unit (K9)</u> of the Roswell Police Department currently maintains three canine teams. Two teams are comprised of "dual-purpose" canines, rigorously trained and certified in narcotics detection and criminal apprehension through the National Narcotics Detector Dog Association.



The third canine team serves as an Explosive Ordnance Detection (EOD) canine, trained and certified through the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency. This team is assigned to the Community Relations Unit and makes frequent public appearances at outreach events.

The <u>Crime Scene Investigations Unit</u> (CSI) provides comprehensive investigative forensic science services to any criminal act in which the identification and collection of physical evidence can lead to an investigative lead or determine relevant information to the investigation. The Unit is comprised of two detectives who respond to incident scenes in the field and operate the Police Department's Forensic Science Laboratory.

The Roswell Police Department's in-house Forensic Science Laboratory provides analytical testing and examination in fingerprint analysis, fracture matching, bloodstain pattern analysis, gunshot residue pattern examination, and serial number restoration. These services are provided to not only the Roswell Police Department, but other requesting public safety agencies as well.

In total for 2022, the CSI unit processed 944 items of evidence for latent prints, bloodstain patterns, gunshot residue patterns, and trace evidence.

During 2022, CSI fostered working partnerships with state and local agencies and expanded mapping services offered in criminal investigations. Of note, CSI purchased a new FARO laser scanner, which provides precise, 3D mapping of crime scenes.

Overview

The Support Services Division (SSD) is responsible for Community Relations, Fleet Maintenance, Property and Evidence, Court Security, Records, Permits, Quartermaster, and Finance/Budget.

Throughout 2022, SSD aggressively pursued funding through grants to both advance and enhance public safety efforts, including:

- Project Safe Neighborhood grant aimed at developing and enhancing trust and legitimacy between youth and law enforcement. These funds will be used to plan new events and enhance our existing youth outreach endeavors.
- <u>Community Project Funding</u> grant aimed at enhancing the Roswell Police Citizens' Police Academy (CPA) and purchasing items necessary for its continuation.
- <u>Department of Justice Hispanic Citizens' Police Academy</u> grant, providing funding for a specialized CPA program for residents with Spanish as a first or primary language.

In 2022, The Roswell Crime Center (RoCC) was funded and launched, elevating RPD to the forefront of smart policing through the use of video integration, automated license plate reader technology, and police computer-aided-dispatch data. RPD now utilizes a real-time crime center platform to respond to crime events more efficiently, aid in crime prevention and reduction, assist with the quick identification of criminals and criminal activity, and provide for increased public safety overall.



In 2022 RPD installed 65 new FLOCK License Plate Reader cameras through the City with direct integration into RoCC.

Community Relations Unit

The Community Relations Unit (CRU) provides a critical role in public outreach and education. Members of CRU regularly meet with residents, schools, businesses, and other community stakeholders to foster ongoing partnerships and strengthen relationships.

Notable Accomplishments:

Added a dedicated Support Services Lieutenant position.

Purchased and trained a new Explosive Ordnance Detection K9, which has been placed into

active service to support key policing efforts.

 Continued our partnership with Special Olympics Georgia, raising \$7,193 through events like Cops on Donut Shops, Polar Plunge, and the Law Enforcement Torch Run.

 Organized and hosted dozens of community trainings, including Citizens' Police Academy, Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE), Revved Up Kids self defense, and more.



 Collected nearly 400lbs of prescription medications through bi-annual DEA Drug Takeback Day, preventing misuse and abuse.

> Organized and hosted "OPERATION: Holiday Heroes," directly supporting 23 local families with gifts and household goods.

Educated businesses, schools, churches, and other stakeholders in **Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) via** site security assessments.



Court Security & Fleet Maintenance

The <u>Court Security Unit</u> is tasked with the protection and security of all employees, judges, and members of the public who work or enter the courtroom daily to conduct business. The unit consists of 4 officers.

Fleet Maintenance is responsible for the upkeep of Department vehicles, and continuously evaluates fleet needs for safer, newer, better, and cost-effective equipment.



Notable Accomplishments:

- Acquired Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and medical equipment management from the Fire Department.
- Equipped all vehicles with "Stop the Bleed" trauma kits.
- Maintained AXON equipment to include body worn cameras, tasers, and in-car fleet video system.
- Purchased 8 new Chevy Tahoes, a Chevy Silverado, and 10 new Harley Davidson motorcycles.

The Support Services Division also maintains Building Operations and Officer Equipment, including Tasers, radios, and uniforms.



Evidence & Quartermaster

The <u>Evidence Technicians</u> are responsible for receiving, storing, and handling all evidence and property, as well as ensuring that paperwork for all items is correctly submitted and logged into the police database by case number and storage location. The evidence technician transports evidence to the GBI crime lab for processing and testifies in court to the chain of custody of evidence. Upon adjudication, items could be returned to the rightful owner, destroyed, or auctioned. Roswell Police Department uses www.PropertyRoom.com, an online police auctions center.

The Roswell 911 Center is responsible for answering both emergency and non-emergency calls-for-service 24/7, 365 days a year. The Roswell 911 Center monitors up to nine radio channels, and has the capability to monitor more than 80 additional channels if necessary. It is also responsible for ten E911 phone lines and more than 40 additional emergency and non-emergency lines. The Roswell 911 Center implemented text-to-911, a next-generation 911 capability that allows the public to text their emergency when unable to speak.

The Roswell 911 Center is consistently recognized for professionalism, commitment to public safety, leadership, and innovation. The Roswell 911 Center performance and training is measured against national standards. Achievements include APCO Training Certification, CALEA Public Safety Communications Accreditation, IAED Accredited Center of Excellence, and Missing Kids Readiness Project certification with NCMEC.

RapidSOS Portal allows Roswell 911 to immediately access life-saving NG911 data, displaying fast and accurate location information from wireless 911 callers. Our 911 Dispatchers can view and map real-time device-based location for calls within the City of Roswell, including the ability to prioritize incidents and query disconnected calls – an incredible safety feature!



what3words is a service that divides the world into 10ft by 10ft squares and labels, each one with a unique combination of three words. It's free to use for anyone, and can be easily accessed by going to the website or using the mobile app and typing in the three provided words. It is directly integrated with RapidSOS so that we automatically receive the three words of where you are and can provide that to responders when you are at a location that is not easily identified by a street address, e.g. Old Mill Park, Big Creek Greenway, Azalea Riverwalk Path.



Nixle is a notification service that will alert residents to emergency weather events, road closings, public safety advisories, natural and manmade disasters, and general city information through email and text messaging.



Roswell's E911 Center is also equipped with Text-to-911 capabilities, providing a means to contact emergency services when it is not safe or practical to make a phone call.
